- 1. Since the start of 2021-22, has your trust enacted a model which sets a 'maximum' time for ambulance handovers to your A&E departments? These have been commonly referred to as 'maximum handover times', 'duty to rescue' or 'w45/60'
 - 2. If so, please describe how the 'maximum handover times' works at your trust how long is the 'maximum' ambulance handover set at your trust and what triggers its use?
 - 3. In which month and year was this first enacted? How often has this model been enacted?
 - 4. Is the 'maximum handover time' still in use now? If not, why not?
 - 5. Has there been any assessment of the impact of the 'maximum handover time'? If so, please give details.
 - 6. If not, do you have plans to enact such a 'maximum handover time' in the next six months?
- 7. If you're not planning to introduce a 'maximum handover time', please could you explain why?

RESPONSE

MWL response

We are contracted by the nationally defined and NWAS agreed standards as below:

The nationally defined target for hospitals included in the NHS Standard Contract states that:

- 65% of handovers should take place within 15 minutes.
- 95% of handovers should take place within 30 minutes.
- All handovers should take place within 60 minutes.

We have not enacted an explicit 'maximum handover time' and are unable to do so at this stage due to the ever-changing level of clinical risk within the department and presenting via ambulance throughout the day requiring a constant dynamic risk assessment to take place.

We endeavor, as always, to transfer patients arriving via ambulance in a timely manner as it is safe to do so.
