That's why NHS England has been working with the DHSC to draft new regulations on modern slavery. The regulations proposed will place legal duties upon public bodies to assess modern slavery risk in supply chains and take reasonable steps to eradicate risk in a proportionate way when procuring for the health service. As a major buyer of goods and services, the NHS has a significant amount of leverage that it will look to use to improve supplier practices.

The procurement and delivery of solar projects, and other NHS procurement will be fully aligned to Procurement Policy Note 02/23, Tackling Modern Slavery in Government Supply Chains.
